was lethargic and as weak as a newborn." Hallie began speech therapy at Easter Seals Central Alabama, shortly thereafter.

Hallie was the obvious choice. Her mother had been trying to physically load her and her chair into an old car. 


## ESCA's Annual Report 2014-2015
